## and Campers,

There is a beautiful Rashi in this week's Parsha I'd like to share. פרק ח starts off with the words:
 "All Mitzvos that I commanded you today, you shall guard and perform."
Rashi quotes a Medrash Aggadah that
 say, "make sure you perform the entire Mitzvah." Continues the Medrash: there is a principle that the person who completes the Mitzvah is the one who gets the credit, even if they did not start it. The example the Medrash cites is that the Posuk in Yehoshua says the bones of Yosef that were brought up by the Bnei Yisroel from the land of Mitzraim were buried in Shechem. Despite the fact that Moshe was the one who brought Yosef out, Bnei Yisroel got the credit, because they finished the journey.

This is amazing! Chazal tell us חכם לב יקח מצות, and the example they use is Moshe taking Yosef out of Mitzraim! This was the ultimate act of selflessness. Everyone was running around, amassing tremendous wealth, and Moshe was fulfilling a promise. He was a hero! Furthermore, it's not like Moshe ran out of enthusiasm for the Mitzvah and passed the buck... He would have loved to finish it! Hashem would not let him! Nevertheless, such is the system. It's not about who starts the process. It's about who sees it through until the end.

What an emphasis Hashem puts on ensuring our goals and aspirations cross the finish line! It's hard to believe that we have already experienced six weeks of camp together. But we are not done yet! Boruch Hashem, we still have two weeks left, and we will do our utmost to keep the pedal to the metal until the very end! May Hakadosh Boruch Hu grant us Hatzlachah to be able to complete our goal.
