This week's Parsha discusses the idea of the עבד עברי, the Jewish slave. As we know, this arrangement was for a time period of six years, at which point the עבד was sent back home. The Torah tells us that upon releasing his עבד, it is incumbent upon the master to shower him with riches for the road. Lavish

Rashi explains what the Torah is saying here: Do not forget - when we were slaves in Mitzraim on our way out, Hashem provided for us not once, but twice! First, we collected the valuables of the land, and then again by the Yam Suf, there was so much wealth, we didn't even want to leave! We had to be persuaded by Moshe. Says the Posuk, if we feel the temptation to send the Eved home empty handed, just remember our humble beginnings, and how Hashem graciously provided for us this exact אחרים. This will encourage us to act in kind.

What a beautiful idea! This is a Mitzvah for all time. This means we have the ability to inspire ourselves to do the right thing by focusing on a אחלה that Hashem did for our ancestors over 3,000 years ago! הכרת הטוב is part of the essence of our people, it is in our DNA. And there is no statute of limitations on gratitude. This is absolutely appropriate. We received אחלה from Hashem, we must repay His children in the same vein.

On this note, it was so gratifying to see what took place this past Monday. To express our thanks to Young Israel for opening their building to us this summer, our campers swarmed over the campus, and gathered an astonishing 6,241 monkey balls! Yes, there were some side incentives, but the Middah of הכרת הטוב resonated deeply this past week at Eeshay! Chevra, way to go!
