



DEAR PARENTS & CAMPERS,

In this week's Parsha, at the very beginning, the Torah recounts the final episode from last week's Parsha, and the heroic efforts of Pinchas in stopping a terrible plague. We are familiar with the story; because of immoral behavior, many members of Bnei Yisroel were dying, until Pinchas executed two of the perpetrators, and that ended the problem. But the Torah, in recalling the story, mentions the full lineage of Pinchas... "Pinchas Ben Elazar Ben Ahron HaKohein." Why, at this particular moment, was it necessary to mention the father and grandfather of Pinchas?

Explains the Kli Yakar, the Torah is highlighting a level of self-sacrifice that was required of Pinchas to carry through with this heroic act. The father of Pichas, as the Torah states, was Elazar. His grandfather was Ahron. What was unique about these two individuals? Elazar married the daughter of Yisro, who was known for his idolatrous practices before coming to believe in Hashem. And although he had the best intentions, Ahron did in some way facilitate the performance of one of our most grevious sins, the Golden Calf. So when Pichas took aggressive action against Kazbi and Zimri, there were some naysayers who were doubting his behavior. Some deemed it inappropriate that one who descended from such "flawed" stock should be the one to exact vengeance for the same sin. So the Torah identifies his lineage to tell us that Pinchas did not care what was being said behind closed doors. He knew what had to be done, and he took decisive action.

Of course these accusations were utterly preposterous! Yisro was a hero, a man who stood up to Pharaoh, father in law of Moshe Rabbeinu! And to accuse Ahron of idolatry was ridiculous! Furthermore, Pinchas knew very clearly what was at stake, he was saving thousands of Jewish lives with this act! Who would think he would even consider hesitating?

But the Torah reveals a fundamental tenet in human nature. We are highly sensitive to what others are saying about us, and it often shapes the way we think and act. The fact that Pinchas was able to banish these thoughts and go through with his plan is noteworthy, and deserves to be illuminated. A lesser man may have faltered, even given the severity of the situation.

In camp, so often this idea comes to the forefront. There is constant interaction in high leverage situations, and we strive constantly to make sure the kids are communicating properly. A negative word could have painful repercussions. But it is so gratifying to see that for the most part, our Eeshay campers pass this test with flying colors! Our sports and other competitions are fun, but positive. Great job on the sportsmanship, Eeshay! Keep it up!
