

In this week's Parsha, we have one of the few examples of a Milchemes Mitzvah, a war that we were directed to wage by Hashem Himself. After the people of Midyan were somewhat successful in wreaking havoc on our nation, Hashem tells Moshe that a response is critical. The Torah goes on to tell us that Moshe selects Pinchas to lead the troops into battle, and Pinchas carries out a highly successful mission.

The Medrash Tanchumah wonders, why did Moshe "pass the buck," and appoint Pinchas to do this job? Did Hashem not speak to Moshe directly when He mentioned this war against Midyan? Presumably the one who received the command should be the one to carry out the directive!

The Medrash Tanchumah explains that Moshe knew it should not be him leading the troops. This was because Moshe grew up in Midyan, and this presented an issue. As someone who benefited from this place, how could he take aggressive action against them? True, they deserved this punishment. But as the Medrash says, "one should not throw stones into a well he drank from." So yes, Midyan had to be destroyed, but it would have to be someone other than Moshe.

What an incredible lesson in Hakaras Hatov! Presumably none of these people who deserved to be eradicated personally helped Moshe Rabbeinu. And they stooped to the lowest level possible, ensnaring us in the worst sin for the sole purpose of annihilating us! Yet, there are no exceptions to the rule of Hakaras HaTov. Goodness, even if inadvertent, must be recognized, and must be acted upon. Midyan deserved the punishment. But a beneficiary of their hospitality could not be the one to pull the trigger.
