

DEAR PARENTS & CAMPERS,

This week's Parsha has the bizarre incident in which בלעם tries to curse בני ישראל. Thankfully, our Father in heaven intercedes on our behalf, and not only are we spared, but much to ברכות's dismay, we cash in on many as well.

This episode starts out with a miraculous conversation between בלעם and his donkey. As Hashem opens this donkey's mouth, his first words to מָה־עָשִׁיתִי לְרָ" are מָה־עָשִׁיתִי לְרָ מָה־עָשִׁיתִי לְרָי are הָכִיתִנִי זָה שָׁלשׁ רְגָלִים what have I done to you that you have struck me three times?" Rashi points out that the word the Torah uses for "times- רְגָלִים," is unusual. The reason the Torah picks this word is that the donkey is delivering a hidden message to בלעם. "Good luck trying to best the nation that has the distinction of connecting to Hashem during the שָׁלִשׁ שָׁלִים of Pesach, Shavuos, and Sukkos. Not a chance Hashem will let that happen."

Asks the שפתי חכמים, what is unique about this מצוה that guaranteed בלעם would fail? Why is this our superpower? We very easily could come up with many more that seem more glamorous, couldn't we? He gives a beautiful answer. Quoting a הגמרא, the Posuk that commands we visit the Beis Hamikdash during these Holidays uses the word "יראה, we should see Hashem." But it could also be understood as "we should BE SEEN by Hashem." In other words, there is a dual purpose in our being עולה רגל as a nation. Not only is it to see Hashem, and gain inspiration from His presence, but it is also to be seen; Hashem wants to see us as well! This is what the donkey was alluding to. "Are you serious?" You want to take out a nation that has this legacy? That three times a year the creator of the universe yearns to be in their presence?! Not a chance!! This is our superpower as a people. We have a relationship with Hashem that goes both ways. We want to be with our creator, but thankfully, the feeling is mutual!

We are so blessed to have every Eeshay learning group run by an experienced Rebbe. The sessions are fire, all our campers are growing! Before we get to the sports, fun, swimming, trips, and crafts, we start the day right. We Daven, and we learn Torah. We talk to Hashem, and Hashem talks back to us, strengthening our relationship, and perpetuating a legacy that is the secret to our continuity.
